

We enjoyed an interesting dinner evening this month where we included surrounding yacht clubs to join us for dinner/speaker. Linda, with the help of Bill Davis, secured speakers, Ashley Buck, Patrol Officer, and Ami Staples, Tagging Program Biologist, both from North Carolina Marine Fisheries. Ashley has been in law enforcement for 12 years, with the last 4 years in Marine Patrol. Ami has a B.S. in Fisheries & Wildlife Management and M.S. in Forest Resources.



Ashley provided history of the NC Marine Patrol that can trace its roots back as early as 1822 when NC enacted legislation to impose gear restrictions on oyster harvest. Throughout the years the role of patrol has expanded, encompassing the commercial harvesting of finfish & shellfish, and then broadening to include both commercial & recreational fisheries. She is one of 56 officers on our local waters monitoring 2.5 million acres of water and over 4,000 miles of coastline.

They stay up to date on all fishing regulations, that can change weekly or monthly. Their focus is to ensure boaters & anglers comply with general statutes and rules relating to fishing, but also with attention to boating safety as they monitor our waterways. They also inspect seafood houses, vehicles transporting seafood and restaurants all over the state to make sure everyone is complying with fisheries rules.

Ami Staples provided an in-depth description of her role in the Tagging Program which started in 2014. The programs play a vital role in assessing fish population by providing information about migration patterns, habitat use, population structure and mortality rates of fish. Their program currently tags cobia, red drum, southern flounder, spotted seatrout and striped bass. Averaging 15,000 fish are tagged annually though efforts by this division, state agencies, university researchers and even volunteer taggers who can be trained & provided tools.



Have you ever caught a tagged fish? Can you recognize a tagged fish? You can get involved by reporting information should you catch a tagged fish. The tags are located and extended from the belly of

the fish or in some cases at the gill. Details needed to report are: species, tag number, length, date of catch, location, what gear was used and if you released or kept the fish. You must cut the tag as close to the body as possible, even if you plan to release the fish. Do not pull the tag out of the fish. Call 1-800-682-2632 to report your tagged fish or use their Online Reporting Form. After reporting your tagged fish, you will receive a packet w/map certificate and reward. In the case of Red Tags, they are worth a \$100 reward by calling 1-800-682-2632.

Following the seminar, dinner orders were taken and served. The menu was a nice selection of mostly seafood, with a few landlubber meals thrown in, and was quite good.

We boarded the 95-foot boat leaving the dock while still in daylight. We cruised past the marinas, around the Port Terminal with Radio Island to starboard, now we are officially in the Intracoastal Waterway northbound under the High-Rise Bridge, past the yacht basin, past Gallants Channel Junction and what I call the chimney island, so named (by me) because all that exists on it is a brick chimney, a remnant of a long-gone fish processing plant. The idea was for us to follow along with our charts, noticing the different styles and types of buoys and markers and their numbering system, the differences in the ICW markers, and all that we talked about during the class. During all of this, our presenter was in the wheelhouse speaking to us through the PA system and pointing out things of importance to focus on.

Then we turned around and headed back south toward Beaufort Inlet where there are three sets of range lights we were going to "run." As we got closer to the inlet it was now approaching dusk, and we were able to witness the lights on the range towers coming on (or not, in a few cases). For landlubbers, as well as unseasoned mariners, a range is a series of lights (normally two), with each one mounted on a separate fixed structure, usually a tower of some sort, and with the nearest one lower in elevation than the furthest one. This allows the mariner to position his vessel to line them up so one light shows directly over the other. This is known as "running the range". This also results in the vessel running down the middle of the channel. This of course is critical for the large container ships that frequent the port docks in Moorhead City.

Back to live action. Captain Terrell now lined up the boat on the Beaufort Inlet Channel Range and ran the range down the center of the channel until he got to the next intersecting range. He then changed course and ran the Fort Macon Reach Range, then changed course again and now the Moorhead City Channell Range lights are behind him, so he had look over his shoulder to run that one. After that we took a leisurely cruise in Beaufort and then back to Moorhead City. It was very en"light" ening.

Cruising at night has many surprises you don't experience in the daytime. For instance, we crossed paths with a small runabout that had his side marker colors reversed. Then we passed another small boat that was sitting idle, possibly at anchor, with no lights at all showing. It wasn't quite dark yet, so we saw and avoided him easily. But you need to be very vigilant when cruising after dark.

We definitely recommend this event, so watch for it next year. It's well worth it!

Safety Article - Key Aspects of Boating Etiquette

Boating etiquette refers to a set of unwritten rules and behaviors that ensure safety, respect, and by following these rules, you can help prevent accidents and conflicts, making your time out on the water a better place for everyone. It's crucial to maintain a respectful distance and attitude when interacting with other boaters, anglers or swimmers.

Tips for Safe Passing When Boating:

- **Communication:** Use hand signals, horns, or radio to indicate your waterway navigation intentions.
- **Slow Down:** Reducing your speed will avoid creating a large wake that could disturb other boaters in your path or docked nearby.
- **Stay Alert:** Watch for smaller vessels, such as kayaks, paddleboarders, and swimmers, that may be in your path. Always be aware of other vessels around you.
- Know the Rules: Regulations can vary widely by location, so familiarize yourself with the rules in your specific area and areas you may travel to.

Key Guidelines for Boat Ramp Etiquette:

- **Prepare in Advance:** Before getting to the ramp, ensure your boat is ready to launch. This should include checking the bilge pump and engines and ensuring that your drain plugs are in if that applies to your vessel.
- **Be Quick:** Pay attention to when it is your turn to launch or retrieve your vessel. Operate efficiently and effectively to avoid holding others up.
- Help Others: If you see someone struggling, offer assistance. A little help could go a long way in maintaining a friendly boat ramp atmosphere & keeps everything moving smoothly.
- Follow the Line: Wait your turn and follow the corresponding line at the ramp. Cutting in front of others will cause frustration and delays in the long run.
- **Common Mistakes:** Don't block the ramp while preparing your boat; limit the time spent in the ramp area.

Tips for Responsible Fishing:

- **Keep Your Distance:** Maintain a reasonable distance from other anglers to avoid their casted fishing lines and respect their area.
- Avoid Crowding: If you notice another boat is fishing in a specific spot, respect their area.
- Manage Your Wake: When you pass other fishing boats, reduce your speed to minimize the wake. A large wake can disrupt other fishing lines and disturb the anglers.
- Follow Local Regulations: Be aware of specific fishing regulations in the area, including catch limits, protected species, and fishing seasons.


